Anime Expo 2006 at the Anaheim Convention Center, July 1-4, in Anaheim, California, celebrated its 15th anniversary with a record-breaking 42,000 attendees. Over \$21,650 was raised by its charity auction for this year's beneficiary, the nonprofit Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC).

The largest convention of its type in the U.S., Anime Expo is a time for me to catch up with international fans of Japanese comics and animation, especially friends from Mexico: David De la Torre Ariza (Animedia <http://www.animedia.com.mx>), Javier Tamariz and Luisa (Animedia, Animediatype magazine), Carlos Edwin Guzmán Ruiz (Manga y Anime de Japon Ciudad de Mexico <http://www.carlosedwin.cjb.net>), Eduardo Romero Orozco (Imagen de Veracruz newspaper <http://www.imagendeveracruz.com.mx>), Wendy Freyria Empanan (askcom agencia creativa <http://www.askcomagency.com/>), and Ian Colín Roditi (Genshiken Radio <http://genshikenr.blogspot.com> [a university radio show]). I've known some of them since AX 2002 when I wrote my LatinoLA article "Anime Finds a Home in Mexico" (web published 12 July 2002).

The humongous Comic-Con International 2006 -- the nation's largest popular culture and comics convention -- is at the San Diego Convention Center, July 20-23. There are a number of interesting programs, such as "Comic Book Law School," "Universal Monsters 75th Anniversary," "Deepak Chopra and Grant Morrison: The Seven Spiritual Laws of Super-heroes," "Animation on a Shoestring Budget," "The Sergio [Aragonés] and Mark Show," "Webcomics 101," "Star Wars Fan Film Awards," "Playstation: PSP University," and much, much more, in addition to creator-focused spotlights, exclusive premieres of upcoming movies and animated features, and a merchant-packed exhibit hall. Comic-Con is also a chance to get autographs from your favorite comic artists and movie actors. Bring your inner child (and children) with you.

If you can't attend Comic-Con, drive the kids to Borders to see the cute, friendly Debi Derryberry who does the voice of Nickelodeon's Jimmy Neutron and other cartoon voices. She's promoting her kids music CD What a Way to Play! The CD has original songs written by Debi and traditional favorites like "Itsy Bitsy Spider," to which she has added translated lyrics in Spanish and Hebrew(!). (Of course I got her autograph.)
